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Recent Events BRAC

(What Does It Mean To You?)

It appeared, early in the day on March 19th, that Mother Nature was throwing a nasty curve ball at MODC by depositing a few inches of wet, sloppy frozen precipitation around the region. However, by lunch time we had sunshine and a room full of people at the Spring Lake Manor to listen to what guest speaker Mike Ruane, from the James Thomas Group, had to say about BRAC. The term BRAC, an acronym for Base Realignment And Closure, is no stranger to those of us who have been around Ocean and Monmouth counties for any period of time. We have been fortunate to survive previous rounds of BRAC reviews from the U.S. Department of Defense because of the superior products and services that our local military installations provide to the country. However, this time around appears to have a different focus, and it is incumbent upon all of us to support the



retention and active status of our bases for the good of our entire regional economy. As a former employee within the boundaries of Fort Monmouth, Mike Ruane has a good handle on the full impact that a reduction in scope or a closure of installations such as Lakehurst, or Fort Monmouth would have locally. Bases throughout New Jersey and the United States are looking to structure themselves in such a way as to be viewed as an invaluable asset to the military, and some of the ways in which that is being accomplished is through consolidation of services and partnerships with private industry and educational systems. For those who ask "what can I do", the answer is simply "get involved". Indicating your support to your local, state and federal elected officials is a good start. And on a more meaningful basis you might consider joining a support group such as the Patriot's Alliance for Fort

Monmouth, or the Friends of Navy Lakehurst. I'm certain they would welcome your participation and support.

"Permitting 101" Seminar

To those of us who are not involved in the world of dredging and development projects in and around the waterways of New Jersey, it might be hard to believe that there is so much passion surrounding the issue of permitting. However, there was no doubt left about the popularity of learning more about this whole process if you were in attendance at the Energy & Environment Committee's seminar on April 6th at



Ocean County College. Nearly 100 interested attendees filled the conference room tο what hear expert panelists from various

government agencies and maritime professionals had to say about the sometimes tedious procedure of obtaining permits for the work that is essential to keeping their businesses up to date and in compliance. Representatives from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers and Birdsall Engineering walked the seminar participants through the entire application process, advising of the things that are common oversights, and the ways in which time can be saved in obtaining the final permits. Probably the most popular part of the program was the question and answer period where attendees were afforded the opportunity to present direct, personalized questions to the panel regarding their specific needs. Based on the seminar surveys that were collected, there seems to be a desire to keep this series of seminars going with similar events being considered in the coming year.

Committee Reports

Business Growth & Development

(Marie Lucier-Woodruff, Chair)

In the absence of Chairperson Marie-Lucier Woodruff, Steve Bumbera stepped up and chaired the April 14th meeting of the Business Growth & Development Committee. With a number of events on their calendar for the next few months, the committee devoted some time to setting plans in motion for some of them. First up is the June 10th seminar titled "Connecting Through Communications" being presented by Susan Young of Susan Young Media Relations. Susan's seminars have been extremely popular, and the committee is looking to partner with the Cultural & Tourism committee to expand the outreach on this program to their community. There are a number of Business After Hours events on tap between April and the end of the year, and a workshop focusing on financial collections in a small business and nonprofit environment is being planned for September. The committee also discussed some of the legislative issues that have been of concern to the business community of recent, and will continue to track anything that might happen in this regard between now and the summer legislative break. The next committee meeting will take place on May 19th.

Cultural & Tourism (Mike Redpath, Chair)

Although the weather was very un-springlike, the Cultural & Tourism Committee pleasured in their visit to the Novins Planetarium at Ocean County College for their March 30th committee meeting. Planetarium Director Gloria Villalobos hosted the meeting, and provided committee members with a tour of the facility, along with a brief showing of some of the many visual treats that await visitors to this 30 year

old star projection theater. The Novins Planetarium is just one m o r e " hidden jewel" that we can claim as ours in Shore the Region. The committee discussed



the possibility of presenting another workshop at the annual League of Municipalities Convention, with a slightly different focus on this year's program. The June luncheon program will be hosted by this committee, and we will be looking to secure a presentation from Trenton regarding the arts and

tourism's role in redevelopment projects, such as those taking place in many of the UEZ communities around the state. There was also some discussion on the public education/media event that this group is planning for May that pertains to the cleanliness and safety of our ocean waters. It was suggested that this might be combined with another MODC event taking place at Jenkinson's Aquarium around the same time. This suggestion will be pursued with the Government Relations Committee who is hosting the other event. A number of supporting resolutions were discussed, and Mike Redpath will follow up on obtaining the necessary prepare such documents inform ation to consideration of the MODC Board of Directors. The next meeting is scheduled for April 19th, at a location to be determined.

Economic Development

(Steve Juliano, Chair)

A spirited group of Economic Development Committee members gathered on March 26^{th} at New Jersey Natural Gas Company's office in Wall to address an agenda that was just packed with event planning and a ctivities.

Bonnie Goldschlag provided an update on the MOM Rail line. and the fact that MODC is partnering with Marine the Sciences Consortium to present that seminar



will address the benefits of smart growth planning around transportation centers and transit villages. Mike Danko explained that the concept of the program came from a grant that he applied for through Sea Grant Coastal Community Development Program, and will use the MOM Rail line as a focal point for the event, which will also be the first in a series of follow up programs to this committee's May 21st Smart Growth Conference. The committee devoted much time to discussing details of that program, and how to best market it to the potential attendees. John Ciufo mentioned that NJ Commerce was assisting in getting the word out to businesses in Ocean County that would be part of a sweep being done by the DEP to determine the sources of medical contaminations. MODC and the County of Ocean will look at how they can help disseminate that message, along with an invitation to a number of educational forums on this topic that are being run in Ocean County in the upcoming weeks. A sub committee will be meeting shortly to finalize plans on the conference, and the next full committee meeting will be on April 23rd.

Energy & Environment

(Genevieve Boehm, Chair)

A bright sunshine and a crisp, cool temperature was waiting for the Energy & Environment Committee up at Fort Hancock, Sandy Hook on March 23rd. The committee meeting was graciously hosted by Jim Wassel and Noreen Bodman of Sandy Hook Partners, who provided the committee with delicious (low fat?) breakfast goodies, and an enlightening update on the progress of the restoration work at Fort Hancock. Jim indicated that, despite the lengthy delays during the

early stages the o f project, they hope t o begin some of the work over this summer. Phase I of the project, which will include а number of facilities that



will be occupied by educational type tenants is scheduled to be in place by the fall of 2005. Over all, the rehabilitation of the 36 buildings under contract between the National Park Service and Sandy Hook Partners appears to be moving forward, and should be a welcome enhancement to the currently dilapidated military buildings that stand there now. The committee received a series of reports from members on energy, environmental and coastal issues, and also spoke briefly about their upcoming seminar, "Permitting 101". Genevieve took a moment to announce her new committee Vice Chairman, Rich Watson, from Birdsall Engineering. (Rich admits that he just didn't step back far enough when she asked for volunteers). The next regular meeting is set for May 4th and is scheduled to be yet another road trip - this one to the Monmouth County Landfill.

Government Relations

(Jack Sahradnik/Tom Hayes, Chairs)

A shift to an 8:00 am meeting time didn't deter anyone (well, at least most) from making it to the Government Relations Committee meeting on March 18th. With a Legislative Forum event coming up quickly, the committee tried to resolve some logistical issues in order that we can move forward with this cocktail reception venue to have the local legislators come out and mingle with the MODC community. The committee will also be hosting the September Candidates Luncheon, and will be looking to see if any changes are necessary in the format of that program. Frank Robinson, of NJBIA, updated the committee members on a few things happening in Trenton that will have some impact on New Jersey's business community, starting with a few proposals in the

Governor's budget. There was some discussion on a few legislative issues that MODC will be looking to endorse having to do with beach replenishment funding, as well as some tourism related bills pending in the legislature. And Assemblyman David Wolfe provided the committee with a few insights as to what will be happening in the coming months as they struggle with the state's budget crisis. The next committee meeting will be on Thursday, April 15th at the MODC office.

MOM Rail

(Bonnie Goldschlag, Chair)

As we approach the completion of portions of the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for the MOM Passenger Rail project, committee members were anxious to hear some good news at their April 8th meeting. After requests came from MODC and the Monmouth County Planning Department for New Jersey Transit to provide more timely and specific updates on the status of the DEIS, it appears that some of that information is going to be made available at a June 3rd meeting of the Community Liaison Committee established for just this purpose. Also, on a positive note, it was learned recently that the appropriate language has been inserted into the federal legislation authorizing funding for projects such as MOM in hopes that there is sufficient federal budget funds available in the future to be requested. MODC will be presenting a seminar in June that will be highlighting MOM and similar rail transportation initiatives as it relates to the state's Smart Growth efforts, in particular around transportation centers and transit villages. The next MOM Committee meeting will be scheduled after the June 3rd CLC meeting to discuss details of that forum.

Non-profit

(Tony Chiariello, Chair)

A packed room, typical of the Nonprofit Committee, was on hand for the March 25th meeting, and wasted no time in delving into their busy agenda. A number of

changes have been m a d e regarding t h i s committee's pending luncheon program, which will be focused on the issue of affordable housing region.



With the looming possibility that their scheduled June luncheon will be moved up to April, final preparations were made for logistics so that they are prepared for the short notice change in dates. Tony also discussed

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the effort being made by various members of the committee to participate in the Silver Gull ad journal once again this year. This is a great opportunity for some of our nonprofit members to get into an otherwise cost prohibitive advertising spot for a small cost. The committee also began to look at future programs that they can present to the MODC membership, the first of which could possibly be sometime in June and will be a seminar on the current trends in charitable giving. Chairman Tony Chiariello asked committee members to review the Nonprofit Committee mission statement and provide him with feedback as to whether it needs any revision, and if the committee is currently meeting the goals of the mission statement. The next meeting will be on April 22, at a location to be determined.

Technology

(Bill Eventoff, Chair)

The first meeting of the Technology Committee with the attendance of the recently merged Business Education members took place on April 5th, and the new committee members were promptly put to work on a program that will take place in the fall. Jim Mahlmann and Wayne Sos have asked MODC to cosponsor an event that they have been planning, which would be a form of trade show and educational forum. MODC's technology survey has provided a number of priority topics of training that our membership is interested in receiving. The proposal would be to have a series of training workshops at a morning seminar program, and have vendors establish exhibits and be available to explain their products and services as they relate to the topics that were discussed in the morning programs. Details will be worked out by a sub committee over the next two months, and we are looking at an October target date for the event. The committee also discussed the upcoming Technology Forum that is being presented in conjunction with the Brick Township and Lakewood Chambers of Commerce on April 27th. All exhibits and sponsorships are sold now the task is to fill the room with attendees. Also on the agenda were discussions on the economic & business development promotional program that Marshall Wright has spearheaded. He has been working on the way in which this information will be established on the MODC web site, with links to resources on economic development. More to come on that in the next month or so. The committee also approved a supporting resolution for the proposal to create partnerships in some of the research colleges and universities in New Jersey to help them attract more funding and better levels of students. The resolution will be sent to the Government Relations Committee and the Board of Directors for further approval. The next committee meeting will be on May 10th at the MODC office.
